- To shape desirable and favourable attitudes and develop skills of students for equipping them to face the challenges in all walks of life.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The Head of the departments ensure the smooth functioning of the activities of the department with the help of other members of the departments.

Regular meetings of the staff council are held to discuss and decide on matters relating to academics and administrations.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Teachers are encouraged to participate in curriculum design in university. Five faculty members are actively involved in syllabus framing.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- 1. The college has implemented an effective system of teaching and learning. As per changing requirement the process is enriched by adopting new methods of learning like use of power point presentation, use of internet etc.
- 2. Many Departments use charts and models for effective teaching.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and evaluation is conducted according to Dr. B.A.M.university, Aurangabad. Internal assessment for UG through Test and tutorial are strictly conducted according to the norms given by Dr. B.A.M. University.

Assignments and projects are given to students.

Teachers are involved in paper setting, paper assessment etc. at university level.

6.3.4 Research and Development

A number of sophisticated instruments necessary for research have been added to various departments.

The research committee provides guidance to teachers for pursuing research.

Many teachers are engaged in Minor and Major projects.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library has facilities like internet facility, Provision of Inflibnet's N-list Programme of e-journals and e-books .

New books are added every year as per demand from the faculty and students.

The library also has circulation service for the students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- 1. Class III and IV non teaching staff is motivated to improve their educational qualification and technical skills.
- 2. Open door policy for sorting matters by discussions and consensus.
- 3. Teaching faculty is involved in the extracurricular activities like conduction Of exams e.g MTS, UPSC, MPSC and admission process etc.
- 4. Academic and co-curricular activities are run and managed by 40 committees of staff members

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Faculty and Staff recruitment are made as per the guidelines of UGC as well as Government of Maharashtra through M.P.S.C.

Clock hour basis teachers are appointed as and when necessary.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

No formal collaboration with industries. Industrial visits tours are arranged for the students by various Dept.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admission committee is formed every year which follows the rules of Government of Maharashtra as well as University rules related to reservation and admission.

Analysis of Students' Feedback on Teaching

Academic Year: 2012 - 2013

Students' feedback on the practice of teaching has been one of the significant exercises. The feedback, as a matter of fact, is taken once a year for all under graduate and post graduate programs offered. It reflects students' opinion about the teaching practice adopted by the faculty members.

The questionnaire is comprised of tags namely - (a) = 'Totally agree', (b) = 'agree', (c) = 'disagree', (d) = 'totally disagree' and (e) = 'cannot say'. Each tag was assigned the weights of 5,4,3,2, and 1 respectively. Then total score is obtained and divided by the total number of forms which equals the percentage score of the teachers. The final score is calculated as:

Total Score= [5*(a) + 4*(b) + 3*(c) + 2*(d) + 1*(e)]

Average Percentage Score=Total Score/Total no. of forms.

Parameters applied for the analysis include:

- a) Teachers' knowledge of the subject
- b) Communication skills
- c) Teachers' attitude towards students
- d) Sincerity
- e) Facilitation of overall development of student personality.

Using formula mentioned above the final score is arrived at. The scale applied has three levels namely – when the average score is greater than or equal to 90, the teach is classified as 'excellent'; when the average above 75 and below 90 the teacher is classified as 'very good' and likewise when the average in between 60 - 75 the teacher is classified as 'good'.

The highest score is 100%; the lowest 77.83 while the average is 94.40%. In short, nearly all teaching faculty members have scored quite an impressive feedback from the students on the parameters assessed.
