MentorMentee Scheme: Mentor Mentee Scheme in the Government College of Arts and Science, Aurangabad is through the IQAC of The College. The goal of the scheme: The goal behind the Scheme is to guide the students at various levels like personal, academic, difficulties faced in college campus and career guidance. Mechanism of the scheme: The teaching staff is divided into class mentors and group mentors based on the strength of the college each group mentor has to follow the following guidelines: 1) Each class mentor should conduct three meetings (one in first Semester and another in second semester) with the group mentors and the report of the same should be submitted to IQAC at the end of April along with the list of newly admitted Students. 2) Group Mentor should take one meeting monthly with their mentees and submit the record to the class mentor. 3) The main aim behind running this scheme is academic progress and excellence of the students. The group mentor should personally inquire about the progress of the syllabus and various impediments faced by the students in

achieving their goal. The group mentor should adhere to the following guidelines and keep a note of it: i) Academic progress of the students, and the reason for failure. ii) Students' involvement in various curricular and cocurricular activities and awards received for the same. iii) The students should be informed about the career guidance available in college they should be encouraged to take part in various College activities. iv) Students

should be informed about various facilities in the college like antiragging Cell, Internal Complaints Cell, Competitive exam centre, various committees for students' welfare, facilities in library, Eresources etc. v) Group Mentor should keep a record of the attendance of their mentees and should contact the respective teachers in case of low attendance. vi) Track of the students' record for three years should be kept in the Departments (for M.A.). vii) While submitting the reports to the IQAC, a detail report should be submitted about the work done by the mentors and the output. viii) The MentorMentee Scheme report of the IQAC will be based upon the report given by the class mentors and hence it is expected that the class mentors should submit the report within time.

The college office authorities coordinate with the PWD department. The college follows the procedure laid down by the state government for maintenance. Maintenance of Electrical, Electronic equipment and

laboratories: The college has a permanent technical employee for the maintenance of electrical and electronic work of the departments. The same employee has been designated to look after the requirements of all the laboratories of the college including chemicals, equipment machinery etc. The various departments of the college submit a written application to the inward section to fulfill their need for facilities in their department. The application is directed to the technical employee, who looks into the matter to provide relevant service to the developments. There are four important committees of faculty members which observes the work. Those are Library committee, DPDC Committee, Purchase Committee and Write off committee. Write off Committee completes the government procedure for the disposal of an old furniture, equipment, electronic gadgets etc. which are outdated and not in working conditions. There are annual contracts regarding Internet services and website maintenance. Contracts are according to government rules. College follows the rules and guidelines laid down by state government for its maintenance. All the committees work efficiently to maintain and upgrade the various facilities in college without delay.
